What is OA mission about?

Sixty years ago, children in Baptist Sunday schools were asked to collect packets of vegetable seeds and send them to BMS Headquarters in London. They were sent to help a pioneer agricultural missionary in India this was the start of something big. The Baptist Men's Movement became involved and named it Operation Agri. Today it has become an independent organisation and spread its wings far and wide.

In the early years, a college lecturer named Jack Norwood whom I knew, went out to Ntondo in Congo and built solar-powered incubators for day-old chicks. John Mellor ran an agricultural project there for many years. Other colleagues in India taught better methods of agriculture and animal breeding. David Stockley, the pioneer, and John Smith in India, Alan Casebow, Ian Pitkethly in Congo and others joined their ranks and extended their work. OA began to see need in other countries such as Brazil, Albania Pakistan and Bangladesh it spread its work to include many other aspects of development besides agriculture. Churches in Britain learned about their activities and began to support them particularly through their Harvest offerings.. We at Green Lane have done so for many years and now we have the opportunity to contribute to it again.

This year OA is asking us to help women in Mozambique to develop a project named "Vital Vegetables". In England we have a wide range of vegetables. Dieticians tell us that they are essential for healthy living. In many countries people's choices are very limited consequently their health suffers. Children in particular do not get the help they need to grow fit and well. OA is mobilizing women to form groups who will develop new methods of growing new vegetables in a way which not only improves their and their children's health but also provides them with a means of income to put their children into schools.

OA is a small charity compared with Oxfam or Christian Aid.yet it goes a long way. Village people can manage small-scale projects they feel ownership of them. They fit in with their way of life; they can organize them and suggest improvements. Moreover, when their neighbours see the benefit of their actions they want to imitate them. The ripple effect spreads far and wide and it is all done in the name of Jesus.

So as we wander round the well-stacked row of vegetables in our local superstore, let us show our thankfulness by supporting OA generously. It brings life to those in need. And so, just like the Hokey-Cokey song, that's what it's all about!


